 GEORGE 'G' Naval Beach Party, was formed at Coulport House and Inverkip House, Scotland, in July/August 1942. They later became, after training at HMS Armadillo, GEORGE 'G' RN Commando. However in the early days GEORGE 'G' Naval Beach Party was split as follows:

Commanding Officer (CO) Lieutenant Commander O C MacDonald RANVR. Principal Beach Masters:

'G1' - Lieutenant Pilditch RN

'G2' - Lieutenant Redshaw RNVR

'G3' - Lieutenant MacArthur RNVR

Assistant Principal Beach Masters:

'G1'?

'G2' - Lieutenant Turton

'G3'?



He met up with Bill and Tom again at the invasion of Sicily, and the invasion of southern Italy, the following Summer when his Landing Craft was in use again, this time by NAN 'N' Commando.
